'm hoping to go on retreat for a few days soon. Priests are encouraged to go on a retreat each year to spend some time in a place of calm and stillness to reconnect with God.

Of course, retreats and quiet time aren't the preserve of priests and ministers. Many people - whether religious or not - enjoy spending a few days in peaceful surroundings away from the literal and metaphorical noise of the world we live in, where most of us. through our phones, are - for good or bad - continually on call, and where we're frequently surrounded by computers, TVs, radios, and background hubbub.

But silence isn't just about getting away from the never-ending noise that accompanies life. St Benedict of Nursia in Italy (AD 480-547) founded the Benedictine monasteries. To help his monks live together in community, he wrote a 'Rule'. In it, he states: 'So important is silence, that permission to speak should seldom be granted even to mature disciples, no matter how good or holy or constructive their talk. because it is written:" in a flood of words vou will not avoid sin." (Proverbs 10:19)'

Our tongues are the hardest part of us to manage. I'm sure we've all experienced that desire to speak our mind or tittle-tattle. And then there are those times when our tongues run ahead of us before our thoughts have caught up, leading sometimes to something being said which is unintentionally tactless

or hurtful. And those wounds can be slow to heal: while harsh words can be forgiven, they can never be taken back.


It's true that imposing silence on someone can be just as harsh as a physical attack. In a democratic society, the freedom of speech and thought are fundamental, with the imposition of silence being just as harmful as hurtful words. It's also true that many get nervous if things go unexpectedly quiet; many of us are no longer used to silence.

But it's also in the silence that we find God. The former Archbishop of Canterbury Dr Rowan Williams once described prayer as like sunbathing in the presence and radiance of God. We need to create space and silence in our hearts and minds, taking the time to wait and listen for God to speak to us.

And we don't necessarily need to get away to do that. Our church buildings have been steeped with prayer over the centuries. So it's no surprise to me that many people - whether they're regular members of our congregations or not - pop into our churches to spend a little time in silence during their busy days, lighting a candle perhaps, and reconnecting with themselves and maybe also with God.

As people continue to try to find a little peace and quiet in their lives, I pray that our churches will be places in which people continue to find refreshment for their soul for many centuries to come.



This month we are delighted to be able to report that the Church

Roof Fund is now nearly halfway to the target of £10,000. A hugely successful cake sale in March added £202.78 and with £690 Gift Aid now claimed the total stands at £4,208.88.



Many of you have been asking me if I've done the Spitfire flight yet.

Well, on Sunday 14th April at 11:30am and in perfect flying conditions, I did and it was a fantastic experience. Thank you to all who contributed



My pilot was

an experienced ex-RAF instructor called Charlie Brown (really!) and the Spitfire was almost 80 years old, having been produced in Castle Bromwich, Birmingham, in 1944. After taking off from North Weald airfield we banked left and headed towards Chelmsford at 240mph. Needless to say, I spotted a couple of golf courses en-route which will need checking out in due course! From Chelmsford we headed towards Colchester where the airspace was free and allowed for some aerobatics. with looping the loop & barrel roll paramount. I then got to fly the Spitfire myself for a couple of minutes, albeit in a straight(ish) line with a few gentle turns, which was awesome. This was also when the London skyline was visible out of the left side of my canopy. We then headed back to the airfield where the soft landing would put most commercial pilots to shame.

My wife, daughter, son in law & 2 grandkids (Toby & Annabel) were there to witness this amazing life



experience. Thank goodness Rosey Leas tearoom was next door!!

Our next meeting is on the **14th May** when Ed Fairey from the National Garden Scheme (NGS), will give us a talk about the history and work of the NGS including their gardens. Doors open at 7:45pm with a start at 8:00pm. Members free, nonmembers £3. Refreshments available.

Our annual plant sale is on 18th May at 9:30am in the Village Hall. Besides a wide selection of plants for sale there will be a bric-a-brac stall, book stall and refreshments including home made cakes. Please come along, there is always a gap that needs filling. Also if you have any spare plants please bring these along for sale.

5 Ways to hide a fence:-

Garden fences and other boundaries are essential for providing shelter and privacy in a garden, but as one of the largest single elements in a plot, they can set the tone of the whole garden, so don't let their functionality prevent them from being an element of beauty.

Bear in mind that all garden boundaries will require some form of maintenance so it's vital to allow access to do this.

1. Grow climbers up your fence/wall - these can be easily upgraded by adding climbing plants, such as roses, clematis, jasmine and honeysuckle. Simply fix wires or trellis to the fence, which climbing plants can use for support, and which you can tie stems into as they grow. Annual climbers like morning glory and sweet peas can be grown to fill gaps while the perennials grow.



- 2. Paint your fence fences can look quite bedraggled if they have not been maintained in a while, but upgrades are fast and inexpensive. A lick of paint or wood stain visually revives a fence in a flash. Pale hues make a space feel larger, whilst bright colours add excitement. But if you want your fence to disappear, go dark.
- 3. Plant a hedge in front of your fence this is a long term option, but a thin hedge planted in front of your fence will add depth to your boundary, offering additional protection from noise and wind, while looking more pleasing and providing a valuable habitat for wildlife too. Bear in mind that once established, you will need to trim your hedge at least once a year.
- 4. Add hanging planters to your fence adding hanging pots or other planters from your fence can be an inexpensive way of hiding it.
- 5. Plant a border- a well planted border comprising small trees and shrubs, tall herbaceous plants and low growing perennials, will create depth and interest in your garden. Choose plants of different heights, that flower at different times of the year and include a few evergreens for winter interest.



The face is engraved with a skull with two pairs of crossed bones beneath and a sand timer above. On each side of the sand timer are two nails pointing towards the skull.

The imagery is an example of 'memento mori', fashionable between the mid-16th and mid-18th centuries, reminding the wearer of the fragility of time and the inevitability of death. The four nails refer to the crucifixion of Jesus Christ, which could suggest recusant use.

As we know from St Cecilia's own Roof Fund, churches are generally old structures requiring considerable up keep. As bell ringers we have a bell restoration fund (The Hertford County Association of Change Ringiers Bell Restoration Fund) dedicated to the up keep of our churches' bell towers. The fund was set up in 1972 and has supplied grants totalling almost a



quarter of a million pounds, with local churches benefiting from the fund including: Bishop's Stortford in 2022 - retuned and rehung all of their bells, Furneux Pelham in 2020 - lowered the ringing room to the ground floor, Much Hadham in 2018 - refurbished the bells and tower, and Thorlev in 2017 - repairs to the wooden wheels that allow the bells to ring. In all of these cases the grant only covered a fraction of the costs so each church would have had to do further fundraising and apply for other grants to help with the essential work. So behind the scenes of the beautiful sound of church bells is a team of volunteers working tirelessly to maintain the tradition of bell ringing.



Nature Notes

As it is now migration season, many new birds are arriving in the UK and occasionally, some rarer species can turn up. Consequently, I have been out and about, both locally and further afield to see what I can come across.

The highlight bird for me was finding 5 Little Gulls at the lagoons near Stansted Airport. A rarity for Herts and west Essex. Sadly, the light that morning was dreadful, so my photos were not as sharp as I would have liked. They were, however, good enough to guarantee the record for the Essex Bird Club. My first local sighting of this bird.

Another rarity was a Long-billed Dowitcher. This is a bird from the USA and has been seen on and off at Cley Reserve on the Norfolk coast. In early April, I managed to get some pleasing shots of this wader feeding with Black tailed Godwits.

Local migratory birds have included a Little Ringed Plover at the lagoons, Swallows at Hatfield Forest lake and the lagoons, Willow warbler, Chiffchaff and Blackcap in Millennium Wood and a little further away, a pair of Stone curlews in The Brecks in Norfolk.

A trip to Lakenheath RSPB reserve gave great views of Reed buntings and very distant views through the telescope of both Garganey, (a summer visiting duck species) and a Bittern.

I am writing this piece earlier than usual as I am off for a week's bird watching and photography in The Gambia in mid April. A country I have wanted to visit for many years. I managed to get a good deal on the return flight from Gatwick and have booked a room on the beach in Sanyang. I have also booked a local bird guide for a couple of days. Yankoba will drive me to some of the top sites in the country, one of the best countries in the world for birds. I anticipate seeing more than 200 species in the time I am there.



The Hundred Parishes Society

As day length increases and the air becomes warmer, plants put out new shoots. Many insects emerge and birds pair up, preparing to breed. Since the 1960's the average minimum winter temperatures have been rising. Snow fall is now a rarity, and frosty days are much less frequent. The current growing season is almost a month longer than 50 years ago. Primroses and bluebells are opening earlier. Researchers recorded that the first flowering of some 406 plant species has advanced by almost a month since 1986! This has a knock-on effect for the time of emergence of pollinating insects such as bees and butterflies; some are adapting to the warmer climate.

Hedgerow shrubs and trees are leafing and flowering earlier too, providing food for so many hungry caterpillars which are ideal food for nestlings. Hedgerows are a valuable wildlife habitat, often providing a living framework to the landscape and our rural heritage. Long-established hedges grow in soil that is rich in stored carbon and older trees within the hedgerow also hold large stores of carbon.

A recent planning application to fell an ancient hedgerow oak close to Clavering led to a vigorous and successful campaign by residents to save it. This tree is now registered on the Ancient Tree Inventory, a record similar to the one for listed buildings. There are more trees in local hedgerows that could be recorded - details of how to do this can be found on https://ati. woodlandtrust.org.uk/how-to-record.



National Hedgerow Week

organised by the Tree Council runs from 6th May to 12th May

and is timed to showcase hedgerows resplendent with fresh new growth and full of wildlife. Please enjoy one or more of the many walks listed on the Society's website - and consider recording some of our wonderful old trees.


