Isabel Hospice's much-loved Christmas Tree Collection and Recycling Service is back this January, giving residents across eastern Hertfordshire an easy, eco-friendly way to recycle their real Christmas trees while supporting local hospice care.

From 9th to 12th January 2026,

volunteers will collect trees from designated postcode areas across eastern Hertfordshire. Last year, over 1,500 trees were collected, raising an incredible £23,000 for the charity's "Together at Christmas" campaign.

A suggested donation of £15 helps fund vital services such as the Inpatient Unit,

Time to Man Up

Let's talk about something most men would rather avoid — the prostate. It is a small gland that can cause big problems if cancer develops, yet a quick check could make all the difference.

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer in men in the UK, with 1 in 8 men diagnosed in their lifetime. But not every man needs a test straight away — what matters is knowing the symptoms and when to get checked.

Possible warning signs include:

- Needing to wee more often, especially at night
- Difficulty starting or stopping urination
- A weak flow or dribbling
- Feeling like your bladder hasn't emptied properly
- Blood in your urine or semen
- Pain in the lower back, hips, or pelvis

These symptoms don't always mean cancer, often it is just an enlarged (but harmless) prostate — but it's always worth checking.

If your GP thinks a check is needed, it usually starts with a digital rectal examination (DRE) (yes, the famous "glove and finger" moment!) and a PSA blood test. The DRE takes seconds, the PSA test is a blood

sample, and together they can help spot any early warning signs.

Women routinely go through cervical smears and mammograms so us men need to man up! A bit of awkwardness is nothing compared to peace of mind.

If you have symptoms, are over 50, or over 45 with a family history of prostate cancer, talk to one of our GPs here about whether an examination and test might be right for you. A quick chat could save your life — and yes, you can still make jokes about it afterwards!

There will be no article in January, but I will be back with you the following month.

From all the doctors and staff at the Health Centre, we would like to wish you a very Merry Christmas and a healthy, happy New Year.

This week, Little Hadham Primary celebrated Anti-Bullying Week 2025, with the theme Power for Good. The week began with Odd Socks Day on Monday, celebrating what makes everyone unique. The woods are certainly changed now that we are nearing the end of Autumn. The floor is covered in a carpet of leaves, dotted with the last of the apples which have fallen from the trees. There is still some greenery hanging on, but now it is the underrated shades of brown which are to be appreciated.

The trunks are bared to the elements, silhouetted against the grey, leaving the wood feeling more open and sparse than just a few weeks ago. Though with careful exploring there is still plenty to be found. The trees are full of birds, great and blue tits as well as long tailed tits, and of course the friendly robin who is now looking ready for his season. The squirrels are running around collecting what they can find whilst they can.

But the stars of the show are definitely the fungi that have appeared in the damp and decay of the Autumn. I have to confess I am not up on my fungi species, but something which I am keen to resolve in the coming weeks as the kids are keen to find out there official names! Until that point, we have been relying on our descriptions... There are ones which look like elf mushroom caps, there are the frilly fairy steps, one we have named the 'gruffalo', and a very beautiful snowflake one. There is also a remarkable one which almost looks like miniature deer antlers.

Best Winter Flowering Clematis.

Winter-flowering clematis bring cheer to the garden in the dullest months. There are several varieties. with some of the most common and easy to grow being varieties of Mediterranean native Clematis cirrhosa, which includes 'Freckles'. 'Wisley Cream' and 'Jingle Bells'. These are hardy enough to grow outside in the UK during winter and flower at some point between November and February. These evergreen climbers can be grown through other plants, such as climbing or rambling roses, where they extend the season of colour and interest. flowering when the rose is dormant.

Other winter clematis include Clematis napaulensis and Clematis urophylla 'Winter Beauty', which are only borderline hardy so need a reliably mild spot.

How to grow:-

Grow Clematis cirrhosa in moist but free-draining soil in a sheltered spot in full sun. Its roots should be kept as dry as possible in winter, so make sure the soil does not hold water for too long, adding compost or grit if necessary, as this will help to avoid the roots rotting during long periods of cold, wet weather. Tie stems into their support initially, after which they will twine themselves. Cut back lightly after flowering.

Borderline-hardy winter clematis must be planted somewhere mild, and in colder parts of the country may only be viable in a conservatory or greenhouse. Prune lightly after flowering.

Clematis Cirrhosa 'Wisley Cream'



One of the first Clematis cirrhosa cultivars, 'Wisley Cream' bears greenish flowers that mature to a creamy white, from November to March.

Height x Spread: 4m x 1.5m



Clematis Cirrhosa 'Jingle Bells

This Christmas-flowering variety blooms from December through to March, bearing large, creamy-white flowers.

Height x Spread: 5m x 2m

Clematis cirrhosa var. balearica



This variety has creamy-white flowers with delicate pink freckles from December to February, with a more subtle effect than the more heavily speckled 'Freckles' variety.

Height x Spread: : 2.5m x 1.5m

Clematis x Cartmanii 'Avalanche'

Flowering in warmer parts of the country from February to April,



Clematis 'Avalanche' bears masses of white flowers against a backdrop of dark-green leaves. Unlike varieties of Clematis cirrhosa, it thrives in partial shade. Although hardy to -7°C, it may suffer leaf damage in cold winters.

Height x Spread: : 4m x 2m



Clematis Napaulensis

Native to Nepal, Clematis napaulensis flowers from November to March. Green buds open to flowers with large, purple stamens. This species needs a reliably mild spot, a greenhouse or well timed protection with fleece, as it is only borderline hardy.

Height x Spread: 3m x 1.5m

Hibernating Hedgehogs and Towering Trees: A month of outdoor discoveries

November has been a month full of excitement and exploration at Woodland Rangers. We kicked off the half term with Bonfire Night fun. Children made edible sparklers using chocolate, dipped breadsticks and colourful sprinkles, then enjoyed real sparklers safely held in carrots under close adult supervision.

For Remembrance Day, children made poppies using sticks and red wool, taking time to reflect on the meaning behind the day.

As the weather turned colder, we explored how animals survive in winter. Children learned about hibernation and woodland creatures like hedgehogs, building cosy shelters to help them through the chilly months. We also looked at nocturnal animals, discovering which creatures are active while we sleep. Pinecone owls were a big hit, and older children even dissected owl pellets found in the woods to investigate what owls eat.



Bin update from the District Councillors

Every one of us in East Herts has been impacted by the recent changes to our waste collection service. That has meant some inconvenience and adjustment but it's change for a very good reason. We all share a planet with limited resources. We can't carry on simply throwing everything away and the new waste service is designed to encourage us to think about what we chuck, to help us recycle more and waste less.

Early results suggest that it is doing just that. The amount of nonrecyclable stuff we bin has fallen by about 43% since July, going from around 4000 tonnes per month to about 2400 tonnes. Paper recycling has jumped from about 100 tonnes to a combined paper/card figure of about 750 tonnes! And together with residents across East and North Herts, our combined food collection is converting around 1000 tonnes of food waste into fertiliser while generating enough electricity to power about 600 homes.





And there's more good news: to help make bin day easier, East Herts Council has created a free app for smart phones - available from both the Google Play and Apple App stores. It gives you personalised bin day reminders, a clear guide on what goes into each bin and much more. Just search for "East Herts Council" and hit download.

It's a small but practical step that will help households adapt to the new collection system.

The Hundred Parishes Society

The Hundred Parishes Society is not a church or religious organisation but we encourage visits to churches because they are often the oldest and most interesting building in any community. Most of our churches are open regularly and welcome visitors.

Our website www.hundredparishes. org.uk has many short articles, including some about various aspects of churches including bells, clocks, memorials, poppyheads, spires, towers and windows. We recently added an article about church fonts, some of which appears in the next few paragraphs.

Fonts hold holy water which is used to 'baptise' people, an initiation into the Christian faith. They are often situated near the church entrance. Our local churches have a great variety of fonts, usually made of stone. For example...

St. George's church in Anstey has an 11th-century font that is rare in that it is decorated with mermen (the male equivalent of mythical mermaids) holding their tails.

Thorley church has a 12th-century font. It was removed from the church and for many years was used as a drinking trough on a nearby farm before being reintroduced into the church in 1855. Its ornate cover was designed by George Gilbert Scott, a prolific architect known mainly for his work designing and renovating churches and cathedrals.



Chickney church has a carved stone font from the 14th century. The bowl is lavishly decorated including shields bearing the coats of arms of local Braybrook and Fitzwalter families.

Debden's 18th-century font is made of Coade stone and is richly decorated with roses and heraldry.

Over the last couple of years, I have been giving a talk entitled "A peek inside some Hundred Parishes churches" to local groups. The talk is a PowerPoint presentation with many photos. If your group might be interested, please contact me on hundredparishes@btinternet.com.

We have spaces available on our adviser training programme starting January 14th at the Manor House in Buntingford. You don't need any previous experience, just an appetite for learning and competent IT skills. You'll attend classroom sessions in Buntingford, one day a week, for 12 weeks, followed by shadowing experienced advisers until you are ready to go solo advising clients on the phone or in person.

Trainees will learn how to advise clients on housing, employment, benefits, consumer issues, debt and more.




