Language and Cross-Cultural Misunderstandings

"That is why it was called Babel, because there the LORD confused the language of the whole world. From there the Lord scattered them over the face of the whole earth".

Genesis 11:9 NIV

Language is our primary tool for communication, but words can easily lead to confusion, especially when we travel or relocate to places where meanings shift. Even when speaking a shared language, words may carry very different connotations.

My Personal Experience

About 30 years ago, while visiting the UK on holidays, I was approached by someone who seemed lost — this was before the advent of digital maps. The stranger asked, me "Are you local?" I was taken aback and nearly responded according to my understanding. In Nigeria, to be called "local" was to say the person was unrefined, backward, not exposed, indeed a derogatory label. I must state that English is Nigeria's official language due to British colonial history. Before I had an opportunity to respond in a suitable manner to what I perceived as an insult, he clarified that he was searching for a specific street and simply required assistance, asking if I was familiar with the area. I wonder what would have happened if I had responded according to my understanding.

I hear Dundee is a charming city in Scotland, and it is the home to the football club Dundee United. However, in Nigeria, calling someone "Dundee or Dundee united" is an insult, which implies slowness to learn, unintelligent and foolish. Expressions that would be considered inappropriate today. How that evolved remains an absolute mystery.

Other Word Traps

"Mate" means friend here; in Nigeria it refers to someone of the same age group or status.

In America, "pants" means trousers. Elsewhere, it refers to underwear.

Loonie: In Canada, this refers to a one-dollar coin (named after the loon bird), but in other places, it might be understood as "crazy person."

We all love gifts. But if you said to a German "I have a gift for you" it means "poison."

Brat: In English, it's a misbehaving child; in Russian, it means "brother."

Even my name is not spared. Tayo, (usually the shorter version of the full name), meaning "of joy". For me, it's my name, but in Filipino, it means "us" or "we" (including the speaker.)

County Councillor to attend September Meeting

Cllr Pope, our local Hertfordshire
County Councillor will be attending
the September meeting and will be
available to answer any questions
which residents may have. Please do
come along to hear about the work the
County Council are currently involved
with in and around Little Hadham and
to find out what their priorities may be
going forward. Cllr Pope has also been
involved in the Highways meetings
which the Parish Council are regularly
having with the Highways team and
Hertfordshire County Council.

Highways meetings with Hertfordshire County Council

The Parish Council continue to meet regularly with the Highways team to discuss both highways issues within the village and potential plans for improvements following the bypass.

At the August meeting, the highways team fed back the results from the speed and traffic surveys which they have recently conducted in and around the village. Whilst the survey results showed that there was generally good compliance with the 30mph speed limit on Albury Road and The Ford,

the average speed limit on Stortford Road was above the speed limit.

The highways team continue to work towards a design for Phase 3 of the post bypass works which will encompass traffic calming measures on Stortford Road. This work is likely to be implemented in 2026/27.

As a result of the ongoing dialogue between the Parish Council and the highways team, we have been able to secure the following improvement works to the village:

- Improved access kerbs at the bus stop near to The Smithy
- Pedestrian crossing on The Ford near to The Smithy
- Bollards to protect the pump on The Ford, particularly given the recent work undertaken by the Parish Council to conserve and preserve the pump and village sign

It had been hoped that a new footpath could be constructed between the Smithy and the bus stop layby. However, due to existing tree roots, this was not possible. The County Council Highways team have two proposals which will be discussed at the September Parish Council meeting as to a way forward in

respect of this matter and residents are invited to attend to share their views.

Should you have any matters you wish for us to raise with the Highways team, please do contact the Parish Clerk or, better yet, come along to the next Parish Council meeting to discuss.



New bus stop at the Village Hall

Residents will have seen that there is now a very fancy new bus stop and shelter at the Village Hall. It is hoped that this will improve access to the Village Hall, particularly as the Village Hall continues to grow and people come from further afield.

Flu Vaccination Clinic

If you are eligible for the flu vaccine, we will contact you by text or phone to book your appointment - please

do not call the surgery. There is no change to the eligibility criteria this year — which include those aged 65 years and over and individuals aged 18 to 64 in clinical risk groups.

COVID-19 Autumn Booster

Saturday 18th October

8:30am - 5pm

Little Hadham Village Hall

Please note there is a change to the eligibility criteria this year. Only those aged 75 and over, residents in care homes for older adults. individuals who are immunosuppressed aged 6 months and over.

From 1st September, eligible patients will be able to book through the National Booking System. We are pleased that Little Hadham Village Hall is listed as a local vaccination site.

We strongly encourage you to book at this venue. If the clinic is underutilised, it may be withdrawn — meaning patients would need to travel further afield to Bishop's Stortford or local pharmacies for their vaccine.

Housebound patients will be visited by a PCN (Primary Care Network) nurse during October and November. If you wish to receive one or both the flu and COVID-19 vaccines, they will be administered during the same visit.

We had an enjoyable visit to a garden called Dragons at Boyton Cross on the 5th August with 17 members and friends attending. Lovely day with coffee and cake.

There will be refreshments in the afternoon, including home made cake. Come along and join in.

How to grow herbs at home:-

Herbs such as basil, oregano, chives and rosemary are easy to grow, providing you with fresh, tasty leaves to use in soups, stews, casseroles and salads, as well as desserts and cocktails. Herbs have other uses too – many have long been valued for their medicinal properties and are still found in herbal remedies today.

Most herbs thrive in full sun in a sheltered position. You can grow them on the windowsill, in pots outdoors or straight in the ground. Sow seeds of annual herbs like basil and coriander every couple of weeks to provide fresh leaves throughout summer. Plant perennial herbs such as oregano, rosemary, chives and mint in pots or in the ground and harvest the leaves as and when you need them. Save seed from annual herbs at the end of the year before composting the plants, but keep hold of your perennial herbs - they should grow again the following year.

Mint - is really easy to grow but best grown on its own in a pot, as it can take over other herbs growing along side it. There's a huge range of mint to grow, from regular spearmint to chocolate mint and even ginger mint. Add fresh chopped leaves to boiled new potatoes or use to make mint sauce.

Chives – another easy to grow herb, chives have a mild onion like flavour and edible purple flowers which bees also love. Grow in full sun. Add fresh chopped leaves to salads and soups, and add the flowers to salads.

Parsley – is a biennial herb, but it's best to grow it as an annual, sowing seed every few weeks. Unlike most herbs, it's best to grow in partial shade where its's less likely to bolt into flower. Parsley has many culinary uses, working particularly well in soups and stews.

Coriander – is a staple ingredient in Thai, Chinese, Japanese, Indian and Middle Eastern dishes. All parts of the plant are edible – leaves, stalks and seeds (which have a wonderful, orangey aroma). Sow coriander seed every few weeks for a continuous supply of fresh leaves throughout summer.

Rosemary – has an unmistakable aroma and can be picked all year round for use in soups, sauces and stews. Grown in full sun in moist and well drained soil. Trim mature plants back to stop them becoming wood.

Thyme – is small in stature but big on flavour. It's delicious paired with roasted veg, soups and roasts. It makes a fine addition to gin too. Like mint there are very many cultivars of thyme, with different scents and flavours – lemon thyme is excellent with fish.

Sage – another mediterranean herb, sage makes a wonderful addition to risotto, pasta and gnocci recipes. Grow in well drained soil in full sun.

Dill – is easy to grow, tastes great, looks good and is very beneficial to pollinating insects when in flower. It's perfect for using in fish dishes and can be added to herb salads.

Basil – no herb garden is complete without basil There are lots of differently flavoured types to grow, which are perfect for adding to salads, pizzas and pasta dishes



Maintenance Update

During the year management trustees identify maintenance and improvement priorities for our 55-year-old building and plan for the August closure. This year we put in place a plan to refurbish the main hall floor. After the work started, challenging issues meant that refurbishment of the floor was no longer viable. The difficult decision was made to have a full main floor replacement at a cost of £23.616. While replacing the floor was not planned, it has provided a longer-term solution and a more modern feel to the village hall.

Volunteers gave up their time during August to tidy up the hall grounds and fill up an 8-yard skip with rubble, old chain link fencing etc along with items no longer needed from the exterior storage containers. Well done to all who helped during August to get work done, not everyone had their photo taken! 

St Cecilia's Church Bells

A church tower can be separated into 3 sections (sometimes four).

At the top there is the belfry, which is the area in the bell tower where the bells are hung in a wooden frame. Each bell is fixed to the axle of a large wooden wheel and the axle is pivoted in ball-bearings across the frame. A rope is tied to the wheel spokes, runs partly round the grooved rim and falls via holes and pulleys to the ringing chamber below.

Next is the clock chamber where the huge clock mechanisms are. Some need to be manually wound up weekly or even daily, however many have been updated to be automatic.

The ringing chamber can either be on the ground floor or on the first floor. The ropes come down in a circle in order of bell size usually clockwise. I have yet to ring in

one where it is anti-clockwise and can only imagine how difficult that would be to adapt to. Fluff coloured section, called a 'sally', on each rope helps the ringer ring at backstroke. Ringers stand in an inward-facing circle behind the ropes, so they can see the other ringers. Floor mats are on the floor to prevent rope wear and not to stand on. Sometimes a ringer has to stand on a box to enable them to reach to ring. If the ringing chamber is on the first floor then at ground floor is the choir vestry which maybe used for various church purposes.

A spiral staircase in a corner of the bell tower provides access to all levels.





It is hoped that this article may help people make the most of www.hundredparishes. org.uk. You are encouraged to step through the menu to get a feel for what is available. If you want to look something up, you might try either Parishes, What's On, Articles or Walks.

Parishes holds the key to lots of things. From either the map or the alphabetical listing, select an individual parish to find out a little about its history, the nearest walks or details for a pub or tea room. Introductions include ideas for further reading and links to useful websites.

What's On lists future events in chronological order. Many entries have a link to further information. We are pleased to give publicity to any event that promotes local knowledge or culture, exploration or conservation.

Articles offers local insight into a wide range of topics.

Walks has general guidance and then three options: Station walks, Quiet Lane walks and Other walks. Scroll down the list to find one that suits your need in terms of location and distance. Then click on the walk number to call it up. The first few paragraphs will describe distance, terrain and opportunities for refreshment. When you find a walk you like, print it to take with you. [Control, P] is a useful shortcut to start printing.



Feedback is a way of telling us of changes or something we have missed – perhaps a pub closure, bus route change, additional activity for What's On, or website links or phone numbers that no longer work.

Chickney and the City of London have one thing in common: they each cover one square mile. But there all similarities end, for Chickney is a complete antithesis of a city – in fact it is perhaps the ultimate rural parish. Its main thoroughtare is an unsurfaced byway, its population of around 30 is thibly disparant and its few listed halidons are mostly well hidden.



Yet Chickney has one little gem – a remote Saxon church that is one of the oldest in the Hundred Parishes. St Mary's closed in 1972 and is now cared for by the Churches Conservation Trust. It is hidden down a gravel track about 600 metres off the B1051.

Quiet Lane Walks - number 301
